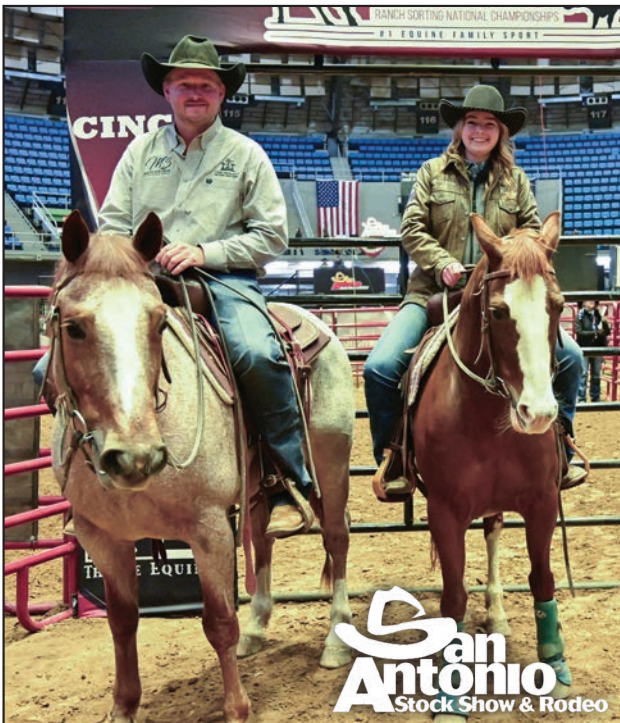

We are currently in the spring season of Ranch Sorting, and the energy and excitement surrounding the Cinch RSNC World Finals is palpable. Contestants are getting back into shape after winter and preparing for local and regional events. Horses are being conditioned, and plans are being made for summer vacations. For some, competing at our World Finals is an annual trip, while for others, it is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

RSNC World Finals

The 2025 Cinch RSNC World Finals promises to be a memorable event, featuring an impressive \$300,000 in added cash and prizes, including \$150,000 in cash alone! The World Finals guide is now available and contains answers to most of your questions. However, here are a few highlights to keep in mind:

1. **Gold Shootout Day:** Friday, June 13, will be Gold Shootout Day, which guarantees the best payout of the year for individual classes, with \$75,000 in added money distributed between the #9 and #13 Gold Shootouts. We will also have an open Gold Shootout featuring a 90% payback that will showcase the top competitors, making it an event to watch.

The finals for these classes will take place on Friday night. If you can't attend, make sure to mark your calendar to watch it on Ride TV! To compete in these classes, contestants must qualify for the Finals and be either Gold or Platinum members. Membership upgrades can be made any time up until the Finals, so there's still time. Additionally, contestants must have logged 100 rides to compete for the added money. Verify your qualifications on the RSNC website under "National Points Race" at rsnc.us. Don't miss out on these classes!

2. **Challenge of Champions:** Check out the Challenge of Champions race on our website to see which contestants have excelled this year and will compete for the coveted title of Champion of Champions.

3. **Event Reservations:** For a smooth and stress-free arrival at the World Finals, please submit your reservations for stalls, shavings, RVs, golf carts, mats, and hay. All reservation information is available on the reservations page of the event guide.

Show Updates

We were thrilled to return to the **San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo**, where contestants from New Jersey to California and everywhere in between competed for a total payout of \$100,248! The cattle this year were some of the best we've seen—evenly matched and challenging enough to ensure it wasn't just a horse race. The footing was excellent, and the atmosphere at the Freeman Coliseum set this show apart. Arielle Weeast and DeRoy White won the Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout, taking home \$5,592 for their team by sorting 23 head over three rounds. Trever Field and Eduardo Leal, a Texas team, stood out by being one of two teams sorting a full 30 head over three rounds, earning them \$6,582 in the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Ranch Sorting also shone this year. Their exceptional hospitality, excellent footing, and various attractions remind us why this event sells out in mere days.

The show paid out \$127,489 in just two and a half days. The unique format, with the majority of classes culminating in championship rounds on the last day, added new level of excitement. Nelson Mas and Olivia Parks, representing the Northeast, emerged as champions of the Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout, earning almost \$6,000 for sorting 26 head in a highly competitive class. Meanwhile, Tommy Roberson and Danie Teltow, a Texas team, won the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout by being the only team to sort a perfect 30 head, receiving \$6,086.

This year, the **South Central Regional** moved to Waco, Texas, and it was a hit! The facility was well-suited for our sport, with stalls and the arena conveniently located in one building and RVs just outside. The footing held up exceptionally well, and restaurants and hotels were within easy reach, so we're looking forward to returning next year! The total payout was \$149,018, with event end times in the 6:00 p.m. hour for the first two days and wrapping up at 4:30 p.m. on Sunday. The big winners in the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout were among three teams that sorted 38 head, with Trever Field (TX) and Emily Sperle (CO) taking home an \$8,312 purse for first place. Additionally, Steve Freiheit (MN) and Harper Grace Pierce (GA) earned \$8,888 in the Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout by sorting 34 head.

Cinch RSNC Updates

The RSNC social media team is doing a fantastic job promoting the sport of ranch sorting to both seasoned competitors and equine enthusiasts. Be sure to follow their content to stay informed, engaged and entertained about all things ranch sorting. Improving communication within the sorting community is a goal we prioritize, and this team enhances it daily. Our social media numbers are rising, resulting in new members getting involved in sorting across the country. One of Equine Network's greatest strengths lies in educating the equine industry about ranch sorting, and the social media team exemplifies what can be accomplished.

FLORIDA RANCH SORTING FINDS SUCCESS ON WELCOME ROAD

THE MCCLENDON FAMILY

put Florida

More and more, ranch sorters are finding their way to Welcome Road in Lithia, Florida—a friendly city with a small-town feel about 40 minutes south of Tampa. Fittingly, that’s the address of Florida Ranch Sorting, owned and operated by the McClendons.

Liz McClendon’s journey in the horse world began with barrel racing as a child, but it wasn’t long before team penning caught her interest in 1976 at a local Florida venue. She competed in the event for years before discovering her true passion—ranch sorting.

“Sorting is unique because it’s a family event,” McClendon said. “Other equine sports often have just one competitor while the rest of the family watches from the stands. But with sorting, it’s affordable enough that the whole family can compete together. I think that’s a big part of why it’s been so successful.”

For many years, Liz's husband, Ronald was her longtime sorting partner until a back injury sidelined him. Ronald has recently passed and now, her son, Joseph, co-produces the Florida Ranch Sorting events alongside her.

FROM SMALL EVENT TO STATEWIDE SUCCESS

In 2009, McClendon transitioned from competitor to producer, hosting her first-ever show. That first event—held in the dead of summer—drew only 60 teams, and competitors had to ride at night to avoid the Florida heat. But McClendon loved it.

Fast forward to the 2024 Florida State Finals held in January, and Florida Ranch Sorting put on an event for 951 teams that paid out more than \$56,000.

“What makes a show successful is people have to want to come,” McClendon said. “We’ve built a supportive community and, after the shows, we hang out, cook out, and dance—it’s a family affair.”

Once produced in an open pasture, Florida Ranch Sorting events now feature a covered arena, stalls, RV hookups and additional barns, all hosted at the McClendons’ Welcome Road property. Riders come from all over—West Virginia, Virginia, New York, Georgia, and beyond—to compete. Some even fly in and have their horses hauled to the event.

PUTTING FLORIDA SORTING ON THE MAP

McClendon started producing shows when her friend, Bob Prine, wanted to host events but not handle the production. Prine had a dream to put Florida sorting on the map. And sure enough, McClendon came through.

She proudly watched as her grandson, Caden, and daughter-in-law, Sarah, played a big role in getting Florida its first win at the Cinch RSNC State Extravaganza in 2021, and notes that the following year, Caden was the Rated Youth champion and reserve champion.

“People said we couldn’t compete with other states,” McClendon recalls. “But I told them—you can. You just have to work hard for it...you can either whine and feel sorry for yourself or get out there and say, ‘If I want it, I have to work for it.’”

Now, Florida isn’t just on the U.S. ranch sorting map. After setting up a live feed for viewers to watch her event online, McClendon found that folks from Spain, Germany, England and beyond tuned in to watch the 2024 Florida Ranch Sorting State Finals.

TOUGH CATTLE BUILD BETTER SORTERS

Sorting in Florida isn’t for the faint of heart. Florida’s weaker grass and fewer natural minerals means ranchers need hardy cattle that can sustain themselves, and Brahman fits that role. When a team crosses

the line at a Florida Ranch Sorting event, they’re looking to best a resilient herd of F1 Brahman or Brahman crosses.

“Florida has some of the toughest cattle around,” said McClendon, who can be found competing with her family and even judging, when needed. “If you want to get 10-headers, you’ve got to be a Tanner Keith-type. It’s challenging, but it pushes our riders to improve. When they compete elsewhere, they find it easier to make the right cuts because they’ve learned to handle difficult cattle.”

AT HOME WITH THE RSNC

Especially in the winter months, Florida is a major destination for all manner of horse sports, so to ensure maximum participation levels, McClendon works closely with other East Coast and Florida producers to prevent overlapping. And she loves working with the Cinch RSNC.

“RSNC has the fairest rating system., They’re a great group, and I love working with an association that listens to producers. You have to have respect for one another.

“My team has been my husband, son, daughter-in-law, and grandson, and that’s what makes it so fun for me,” McClendon added. “But the RSNC is also a family. I hope that they continue to grow, expand, and succeed, and I know that my son plans to continue on with the Florida Ranch Sorting legacy.”

ROWDY FEWEL: THE VOICE OF RANCH SORTING

Rowdy Fewel is a fourth-generation rancher, an auctioneer, and the Cinch RSNC's veteran announcer who's spent 25 years bringing energy to ranch sorting events across the U.S. and beyond. Deeply rooted in family, faith and ranch life, he's passionate about making people feel welcome and believes that hard work and a strong community are the heart of it all.

Chances are good, if you imagine right now what a ranch sorting sounds like, you'll hear the voice of Rowdy Fewel, clear as day.

"Flag is up; cattle are ready," the voice sings.

It's a voice Mr. Fewel has honed for the past 25 years, after getting his start in team penning.

"It was the late '90s, early 2000s," Fewel said. "It was kind of dumb luck. I was at the local arena one night on the sideline from some injuries, and they said that they needed an announcer for the team penning practice. I asked them what you needed to be able to do, and they said, 'Talk.' I said, well, I guess I'm your guy if it pays you anything."

As ranch sorting developed, Fewel moved into that space, growing right along with the sport.

"I've been blessed over the last 25 years to go all across the United States, into Canada," he said. "I had opportunity a couple years ago to Australia and announce ranch sortings down there."

Sometimes, Fewel says with the good humor that permeates his performances, his talents developed to his own detriment.

"We were on the way out on the East Coast one evening and Mr. Wolf, Dave Wolfe, picked us up at the airport—me and another guy," Fewel said. "Dave said, 'We got a really large crowd; we're going to have to find another announcer.' I asked him what for, and he said they were going to run three or four—I'm pretty sure it was four—sorting pens all at the same time. I said, I can do it.

"That weekend I announced four sorting pens for the first time—run four computers, four judges—all at the same time. It wasn't easy, that's for sure, but that's kind of where it started, I guess, to be honest. I guess I was young and greedy, wanted all the work instead of just some of the work. The Lord blesses those too stupid to take care of themselves, and that'd be me."

In doing so, the Lord also blessed the RSNC with an announcer whose unmatched talents rival only his capacity for creating a warm and welcoming environment for everyone around him, whether they're crossing the line to start the clock or pushing fresh cattle up from the back.

"I was told growing up, don't ever ask somebody to do something you wouldn't do," Fewel stated. "It doesn't take any extra to say thank you. We're all human. And when somebody's talking on the microphone, people like to hear their name called, if you know somebody's name and can speak to them and just recognize them by their name."

It's a feat that gets harder each year. In the same way folks used to have a whole phone directory committed to memory, the technological advancements in the announcer's booth have made Fewel's job both easier and more challenging. While he doesn't exactly wax nostalgic for shuffling hand-written entry notecards for four arenas at once, the ease with which names simply appear on the screen in front of him means making the event personable requires a conscientious effort.

As a fourth-generation rancher from Oklahoma, it doesn't take much imagination to figure out where Fewel got his try.

"I wear a lot of hats to be honest with you," Fewel said as he was preparing to work a set of cows in between calf checks on his heifers. "My wife and daughter and I own an auction company. We've been in the auction business for about 12 years. We also run a cow-calf operation here in Muskogee; Angus and Angus-cross cows, some Angus bulls."

Fewel's daughter, Karley, is now a recent Oklahoma State University grad who, as her dad proudly reports, has been happily employed by the Oklahoma Farm Bureau since January. When she was growing up, though, she helped cure her dad of his "wanting all the work" affliction.

"My busiest year, I was gone 49 weekends," Fewel admitted. "When I came back from the Denver National Western, I visited with my wife, and our daughter was about 8, and I told Terra, I said, 'We're going to have to do something different. I spent Christmas in the airport; I spent New Year's in the airport; I spent Thanksgiving in the airport. Y'all are growing up, and I ain't being a part of it.'"

The Fewels recalibrated, growing their herd a bit to take their foot off the travel pedal.

"Fortunately, the good Lord's blessed me that I have opportunities now where I can decide where I go and when I go, and I'm very thankful for that. I don't take it for granted."

Nor does our ranch sorting community. No matter the ability or the age, Fewel is a friend to all.

"The good thing about it is it's a family event. I've seen guys 70 and 80 years old compete, and I interviewed a young lady at Houston six weeks ago, who won her first buckle of Houston. She is 8 years old. That's the cool thing about our event. Doesn't matter your age, doesn't matter your gender, most people feel comfortable in a 50-foot round pen."

GOLD SHOOTOUT ROUNDUP FROM 2025 CINCH RSNC REGIONALS

GOLD SHOOTOUT PAYOUTS WERE PEACHY IN PERRY, GEORGIA

Cinch #13 Gold Shootout

The Cinch #13 Gold Shootout in Perry, Georgia, saw **Juan Carlos Gonzales** and **Ray Roberson** claim the championship title, clocking an impressive 164.56 seconds on 27 head to take home \$6,276.

A winter storm had the event on tenterhooks right up to a few days before, as snow and chilly weather came to the area. But ranch sorters are a tough breed, good weather prevailed, and the event went off smoothly. By the time the Florida team made it to the winners circle, they were all smiles in their interview, happy to be at the event and back in the pen.

"It was 25 or 27 degrees; it was crazy," said Gonzalez who'd traveled from Miami.

Roberson, recently back in the pen after a 17-year break, made the trip from Milton—deep in the Panhandle, about an hour east of Mobile, Alabama—was excited to compete again regardless of the outcome.

"The year before last was our first year back," he noted, adding that he had competed with Gonzalez before.

"We were one of the first teams out, so you have nothing to lose at that point," Roberson said. "When you're first out, you just ride and see how it goes—see where you land."

"Just keep riding" was Roberson's advice as the team geared up for another class.

Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout

In the Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout, **Olivia Parks** and **Fred Kramer** delivered a standout performance, winning \$8,570 with a time of 219.29 seconds on 34 head across four rounds.

Parks, from Three Springs, Pennsylvania, and Kramer, from Jeffersonton, Virginia, went head-to-head against a field of talented riders in Perry. Their consistency and ability to stay calm under pressure proved to be the winning formula, despite Parks' last-minute decision to enter.

"I literally got here at 6:30 this morning," she said.

That call paid off—quite literally.

"We knew going in that if we got six head, nobody could catch us," Kramer said, noting that the second-place team had 30 head, while Parks and Kramer finished out with 34.

"They were just coming out so easily and quietly, but once they got a little tangled up, I decided to get out," Parks said, paying homage to the great cattle at the event.

The team knew their jobs going in, and both riders seamlessly fulfilled their roles.

"That was the plan," Kramer said of letting Parks work. "I know my job, and that's what I'm best at. I've been doing this for 26 years, and I'll stand in the hole for anybody."

RIDING FOR GOLD DOWN IN SAN ANTONIO

Cinch #13 Gold Shootout

On day two of the San Antonio event, **Trevar Field** and his partner, **Eduardo Leal** championed the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout. The team took home a hefty payout of \$6,582, with a time of 159.13 seconds on 30 head in 3 rounds.

Field, of Granbury, Texas, and riding "Ziggy"—a 5-year-old gelding he'd recently sold to a longtime client, but borrowed back for the event—rode into the pen knowing that working cows fast meant working them slow.

"I just told Eduardo to take it slow at first and see what they were going to allow us to do," Field explained. "We decided not to get in too big of a hurry or force something that wasn't going to work. Just slow down, and it'll either work for us, or it won't. You can't force it to happen."

Richmond, Texas' Leal, aboard 10-year-old gelding "Tomato," agreed with the strategy.

"We just wanted to be cool, wait, and see what the cows would give us," Leal said. "We were one of the first teams out, so we were really just trying to pick up a check."

Looking ahead to the World Finals, Field plans to keep his approach consistent as he heads down the road.

“Going into the Finals, we’ll just take it run by run and show by show” Field said. “There will be some good ones and some bad ones, but you can’t force anything to happen, so we like to take it easy and work slow.”

Professional’s Choice #9 Gold Shootout

Meanwhile in San Antonio, **Arielle Wee-ast** and **DeRoy White, DVM** did Oklahoma proud when they emerged victorious in the Professional’s Choice #9 Gold Shootout, taking home \$5,592 with a time of 155.93 seconds on 23 head.

For Stillwater, Wee-ast, this win was memorable, as she was riding “Gracie,” a Metallic Cat mare who was on her first trip to a big show.

“Coming in eighth, DeRoy and I just decided we’d watch, take our shot, flip them, and get them on the other side of the pen,” Wee-ast shared. “And everything just worked out. There was a bit of a fight, but between my partner and our good horses, we were able to make it a success.”

White rode “Tamu,” a 19-year-old mare with lifetime earnings of \$167,000 in the sorting pen, and he had one goal in mind.

“Don’t screw up,” joked White, from Mounds, before getting serious. “We switched ends on the cows, got that bad #7 cow out quick, and just kept working.”

White credited much of their success to the duo’s trainers. His trainer, Shelley Fitzgerald, and Wee-ast’s coach, Joel Lesh, are both accomplished sorters and trainers who have built standout reputations in the sorting pen.

“We’re already getting prepped for [June], although thankfully our horses are already in pretty good shape,” Wee-ast noted. “We’ll go to all the shows we can and keep getting them legged up for Finals. We really gotta make that one count.”

CINCH RSNC CROWNS GOLD SHOOTOUT RANCH SORTING CHAMPS AT 2025 RODEOHOUSTON

Cinch #13 Gold Shootout

The Texas team of **Tommy Roberson** and **Danie Teltow** claimed top honors in the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout when the team rode out with an impressive time of 158.39 seconds on 30 head in three rounds, earning them \$6,086 in prize money.

Teltow, of Waelder, was mounted on her red mare, Smooth Lil Gal, affectionately named “Fluffy” by Teltow’s daughter.

“Tommy and I were ninth going out into the top 10, so we were in a good position to see what we needed to win it,” Teltow said. “Before we went in, 29 head was winning, so we needed a fast 9- or 10-head run to clutch it. The cows wanted to play nice and we ended up with 10 head to win it. We knew riding out that we couldn’t be caught so we celebrated as we rode out of the pen.”

Roberson, who produces ranch sortings with his wife, Laura, under the banner of TR Performance Horses, is no stranger to the winners circle. He’s been sorting for years, and the Robersons have built a wildly successful training business alongside their producer outfit that attracts people from across the world to ride for the TR brand.

“We’re leasing horses to folks from Brazil for the World Finals” Roberson said, noting that he has multiple clients from South America who will be coming to ride in Fort Worth.

For Teltow, Roberson’s experience and stewardship of the sport is part of what makes him such a valuable partner.

“I ride with Tommy a lot, and winning with him is always special,” she said. “I’m grateful for every ride.”

Professional’s Choice #9 Gold Shootout

Allentown, New Jersey’s **Nelson Mas** partnered with return champion **Olivia Parks** to dominate the Professional’s Choice #9 Gold Shootout. The East Coast team took home the win with a total time of 150.48 seconds on 26 head across three rounds, netting them a check for \$5,966.

Parks shared insights into their winning strategy, crediting their success to a strategic approach and favorable draw.

“Nelson and I got really lucky with a good draw: The 2 [cow] was bad, and we drew the 1, so that was a huge advantage to us,” she explained. “Our plan was really to just go in and ride smart.”

Parks rode One Catty Badger, aka “Bethanee,” a 10-year-old mare sired by Catty Hawk, out of a Reys Dual Badger mare. The mare is owned by Florida’s Aubree Coker.

Under saddle for Mas was comeback star Cattlinlireycat—his 9-year-old gelding by Bet Hesa Cat out of TR Oubles Reyd by TR Dual Rey—known widely as “The Freak.” The horse survived a fatal trailer accident on the way to the Cinch RSNC World Finals last year and, since his return from rehab, Mas estimates he’s earned more than \$70,000 in the ranch sorting pen.

“We’ll be in Garwood, and we’ll be in Jersey for a double-qualifier,” Mas said of where he would be entering next with his daughter, Clara, with the goal of getting her qualified for the World Finals, too.”

GOLD SHOOTOUT WACO WINNERS GOT BIG BUCKS AT THE PAY WINDOW

Cinch #13 Gold Shootout

Texas **Trevor Field** returned to the Cinch #13 Gold Shootout winners circle after drawing a partner in Colorado’s **Emily Sperle** to best a tough field in Waco. The team entered the final round toward the lower end of the high calls and, as the cattle proved increasingly tough to beat, they rose to the ranks of victors, earning \$8,312 for sorting 38 head in 202.37 seconds across four rounds.

“It turned around, honestly,” Field, from Granbury, admitted, also noting that he’d been having some tough luck up until that point in the day.

Field, an Open rider in the Cinch RSNC who was also on a qualifying team at last year’s WRCA World Championships Ranch Rodeo, was riding Shuga Rey, a 2018 mare by Smart Sugar Badger out of Reydar, who he’s recently introduced to the sport.

“She’s just now getting the game really figured out,” Field said of the mare he calls “super cowy.”

Field is also getting the game figured out: The Waco Cinch #13 Gold Shootout is the third he’s won in as many months. In February, he won the #13 in San Antonio; in March, he won the class again in Glen Rose, Texas, at the “Moo Lah” Series produced by TR Performance Horses; followed, of course, by his Waco win.

“That class has been the main class,” Field said of his recent ranch sorting strategy.

In contrast, Sperle, of Wellington, entered the Gold Shootout with caution.

“I’ve always had the mindset of staying out of the high-entry-fee, high-payback classes, because I guess I was always intimidated to ride them,” Sperle offered. “But I pulled a check in the Shootout at Reno last year, and I was like, ‘Okay, I can do this.’”

Sperle sold her own horse a few months ago, so she’s been piloting a horse that belongs to her husband, the RSNC’s own Tanner Sperle.

“He’s strong and powerful,” Sperle said of her mount, registered as R Metallic Twister—a 2018 gelding by Dual Rey out of Play Purr View RG by Metallic Cat—who

proved to be a valuable asset as Field and Sperle took a businessman's approach to their final run.

"We knew we needed to slow down and play it a little bit safer," Sperle said. "We both agreed that we wanted a check. We weren't necessarily going for a win. Trever started it kind of slow, and then we just picked up as we got more and more [cows] out. ... We were just waiting for our moment to take them on the ends and kept them going and got lucky with a couple doubles and triples there. That definitely helped."

Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout

Cashing in on the event's biggest paycheck was the draw team of Williamson, Georgia's **Harper Grace Pierce** and Wykoff, Minnesota's **Steve Freiheit**, who won \$8,888 for their efforts in the Professional's Choice #9 Gold Shootout after sorting 34 head across four rounds in a time of 235.11 seconds.

Pierce, 11, may be small in stature, but she's made a sizeable mark in the ranch sorting space since she began competing in late 2022. For this young hand, winning a Gold Shootout was simply the next step in her journey.

In her interview with RSNC announcer Rowdy Fewel following the final round, Fewel noted Pierce's many accomplishments and wins throughout the season, as well as her humble nature.

"They say you're going to be a good hand," Fewel said to Pierce, who employed her mom's horse for the class. "But I think you're past going to be. I think you're already there."

Pierce's partner, Steve Freiheit, recognizes that the higher entry fees might be a turnoff for some folks, but knows that time will tell when it comes to the success of the Gold Shootout classes. He also knows it paid well.

"It worked out well," said Freiheit, who has been a member of the RSNC since its inception, witnessing its continued growth over the years. "The numbers are getting unreal. Like I said, it all takes time."

Freiheit was riding a "well-seasoned" gelding he calls "Gus" and, after Waco, the two had their sites set on a ranch sorting closer to home in Sioux Falls, produced by his son.

"I always have a good time," Freiheit concluded. "It's good people. Some of the best people are in this sport. So yes, it's always a good time."

SUPER FREAK

“The Freak” was that kind of horse before he survived a deadly trailer wreck en route to the Cinch RSNC World Finals last year. Considering the comeback he’s made, New Jersey’s Nelson Mas—ranch sorter and owner of Cattinlilreycat—may consider calling him SuperFreak.

When Nelson Mas purchased **Cattinlilreycat**, aka “The Freak,” in March 2024 he was a relative newcomer to ranch sorting. A building contractor from New Jersey and father of three, Mas had only been in the sport a few years.

“Everybody knew the horse before I even owned him,” Mas said. “He’s a special one.”

The Freak, a 2016 gelding by **Bet Hesa Cat** out of **TR Oubles Reyd** by **TR Dual Rey**, had already earned a few thousand

dollars in the NCHA, according to QData, before shifting to ranch sorting. Under saddle for Virginia’s Tanner Keith, he excelled in the new discipline.

“I knew Tanner,” Mas explained. “He had these brothers—there’s two horses, actually. It’s The Freak and his full brother, Mo—Mo Money. I bought Freak’s brother.”

But The Freak had caught the attention of Mas. He called Keith and bought the horse over the phone, unlike the first time he bought a horse from Keith. Then, Mas was rather new to the horse scene and not fully familiar with the market yet. Wanting to be sure of his purchase, he kept asking Keith to let him ride the horse one more time—which Keith kindly obliged—until Keith issued a timely ultimatum: Buy the horse or move on.

“I asked him if I could get another ride,” Mas recalled, “and he was like, ‘Ain’t no free rides here. It’s either you buy it or you don’t.’ I was like, ‘You know what, I’m gonna buy

the damn horse.’ And that’s how we started our friendship.”

FREAKY GOOD FROM TOP TO BOTTOM

In March of 2024, Mas brought The Freak home to his farm in Allentown, New Jersey—a surprisingly rural and horse-centric holdout sandwiched between Philadelphia and New York City along the I-95 corridor—where the pair began to prepare for the World Finals.

Immediately, The Freak also caught the keen eye of Mas’s youngest daughter, Clara, now 11. Clara is a rising all-around horsewoman who excels showing her warmblood pony in the hunter/jumper arena but loves the speed of a good barrel race and the thrill of ranch sorting with her dad, too. Especially if it means getting to ride The Freak.

“I tell her, ‘Honey, I can’t out-ride them, so I have to out-horse them,’” said Mas, who got into horses about a decade ago, spending

his time in the saddle trail riding until he discovered ranch sorting. “But I’m glad she steals him from me, if I’m honest.”

At the South East Regional Super Sort in Perry, Georgia, Clara took third with Alejandro Serpone in the Professional’s #9 Gold Shootout to win just over \$5,200, outearning her dad who finished seventh in the same class. Mas doesn’t mind, though. In fact, he thinks his horse’s ability to take care of so many levels of riders is a big part of what makes The Freak so special.

“He was voted Best Horse of the Year in another association,” said Mas, who is competing in this Cinch RSNC as a Graduated Novice this year. “He is one of the most seasoned and well-known horses, but a horse is really proven when a low-level rider can ride him as good as an Open rider. It’s a game changer.”

The most remarkable thing about The Freak, though, is that he’s still competing at all.

A FREAK ACCIDENT

Just a few short months after buying The Freak, he and Mo were loaded up and sent down the road to Texas for the 2024 Cinch RSNC World Finals, some 1,500 miles away. They had covered more than 1,400 of those miles when tragedy struck.

“It was terrible,” Mas said of the wreck that killed two horses in the trailer. “The Freak and Mo were in rehab in Texas together, and two or three other horses walked away with minor injuries, and all the humans survived.”

Mas only just got Mo back from rehab in February, but The Freak returned to New Jersey in September, quirky as ever.

“He spooks at the same water he’s been drinking,” Mas said. “Same bucket, every time he looks at it. But he’s just goofy. Not mean. He would never kick, but he loves to do a hop when you get to a new show. He’s not trying to get you. He’s just saying, ‘Hey, I’m ready to go to work.’”

All healed up from the accident, The Freak has indeed gone to work.

“A month later, I went to another finals and won everything you can imagine. And since then, I haven’t been in a show where I haven’t won a buckle or a chunk of money.”

SUPER FREAK

In Perry, Georgia, in January, Clara may have beaten her dad in the Professional’s Choice #9 Gold Shootout, but The Freak made it up to him. There, Mas partnered with The Freak’s former owner, Keith, and sorted a perfect 30 head in three rounds to win the #12.

In March, The Freak had an impressive showing at the Cinch RSNC RodeoHouston ranch sorting, where Mas and Olivia Parks earned championship buckles and \$5,966 for the 26 head they sorted in the Professional’s Choice #9 Gold Shootout. Despite the sizeable paycheck, though, Mas is most proud of winning the All Levels with Chris Mangold at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo for \$2,478 in another three-round sweep.

“Winning an All Levels against Joel Lesh and Tanner Keith,” Mas began to say, marveling a bit at beating two of the top Open riders in the Cinch RSNC; “beating those two guys was definitely one of the luckiest days.”

Mas gives a lot of credit to Keith for coaching him to that win, despite being outridden on The Freak—a horse he used to own.

“This is the third time I beat Tanner on his horse, and he’s there on the stands cheering and coaching for me,” Mas said, still marveling. “He’s a team player. He says, ‘If I’m not going to win it, I want you to win it.’ He’s one of those guys.”

Tanner Keith is one of those guys, and The Freak is one of those horses: Invaluable.

A FREAKING GOOD OFFER. A GREAT BIT OF WISDOM.

Since the COVID pandemic, the horse market has been exceptional with superstar performance horses topping sales across the country at record-setting prices. Reiners, rope horses, barrel horses and the like regularly go for prices that were simply unimaginable a decade ago. Ranch sorting horses haven’t quite hit those numbers, but if there was ever an indication they might, The Freak is it.

“I had an offer of \$225,000,” Mas said. “You understand?”

It’s believed to be one of the highest offers ever for a ranch sorting horse and, reasonably, it begs the question: Why didn’t Mas take the offer?

The answer lies in the wisdom of a burgeoning young horsewoman named Clara, who was 10 years old when she changed her father’s perception regarding the value of great horses.

“We had a \$14,000 pony from Canada that she won everything on,” Mas said, recounting classes won at major events in places like Florida’s World Equestrian Center. “We got offered \$75,000 for the horse. I had to tell my kid. I’m pretty straight with her that we have to sell him. It’s a one-time deal and it’s good money; we’ll probably never get that much out of him.”

“She was quiet for a few seconds, and she asked me, ‘Daddy, will \$75,000 change your life?’ I said no, and she said, ‘If you sell him, it will change mine.’”

Clara kept her pony and, when nearly a quarter-million dollars was offered for The Freak, he turned that down, too.

“I understood then what certain things are about,” Mas said of hearing his daughter’s perspective. “And The Freak is one of those things. He has done so much for me. Why sell him? I can buy another five, and they won’t replace him.”

Since The Freak’s astounding comeback, Mas estimates he has won more than \$70,000, and he plans to add to those earnings when they arrive safely in Fort Worth for the Cinch RSNC World Finals this June. And if all goes according to plan, Clara will have qualified, too, and fans can look forward to seeing The Freak piloted, perhaps, to the winner’s circle by daddy and daughter alike.
